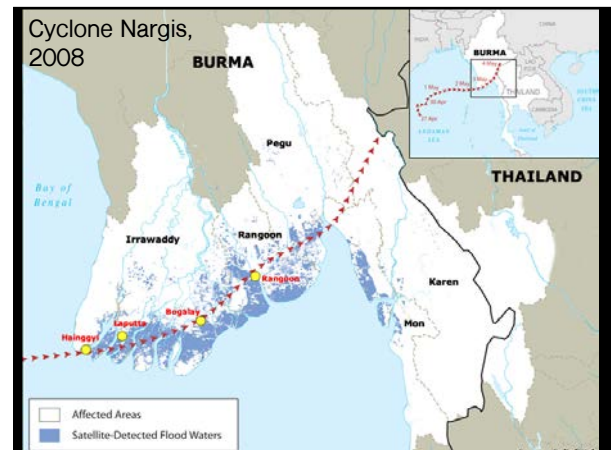


Last week we addressed humanitarian *intervention*.

What of humanitarian *assistance*?

- Humanitarian assistance vs development
 assistance: short-term, disaster relief vs long-term aid.
- Rescue, relief, water, food, shelter, order.

Two examples →





Cyclone* Nargis

- At least 138,000 dead.
- 700,000 homes destroyed.
- Multilateral assistance from 50 countries.

* Hurricanes are called cyclones in the Indian Ocean.



2010 Haiti Earthquake

- ~150,000 dead.
- 250,000 homes destroyed.
- US response: funds, food, hospital ships, marines to maintain order.

(Hint: Feb 26 notes)

Humanitarian Assistance

- Disaster relief involves many global actors:
 - States.
 - International organizations.
 - International NGOs.



Human Security

- Expanded concept beyond national security.
- Emphasis on the individual, not just the state.
- Introduced in the *Human Development Report* (1994).
